Rock 'n' Roll style

Rock and roll is a genre of [popular music](#) that evolved in the United States during the late 1940s and early 1950s. It [originated](#) from musical styles such as [gospel](#), [jump blues](#), [jazz](#), [boogie woogie](#), [rhythm and blues](#), and [country music](#).

In the earliest rock and roll styles, either the [piano](#) or [saxophone](#) was typically the lead instrument. These instruments were generally replaced or supplemented by guitar in the middle to late 1950s. The beat is essentially a dance rhythm with an accentuated [backbeat](#), almost always provided by a [snare drum](#). Classic rock and roll is usually played with one or two electric guitars (one lead, one rhythm) and a [double bass](#) (string bass). After the mid-1950s, electric bass guitars and [drum kits](#) became popular in classic rock.

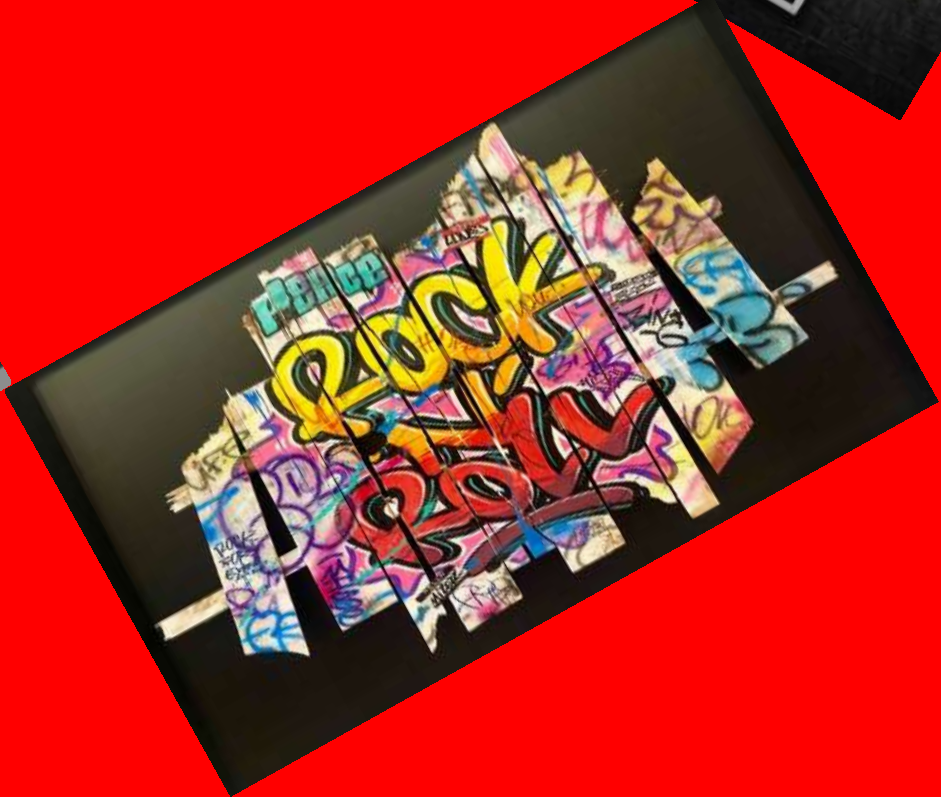

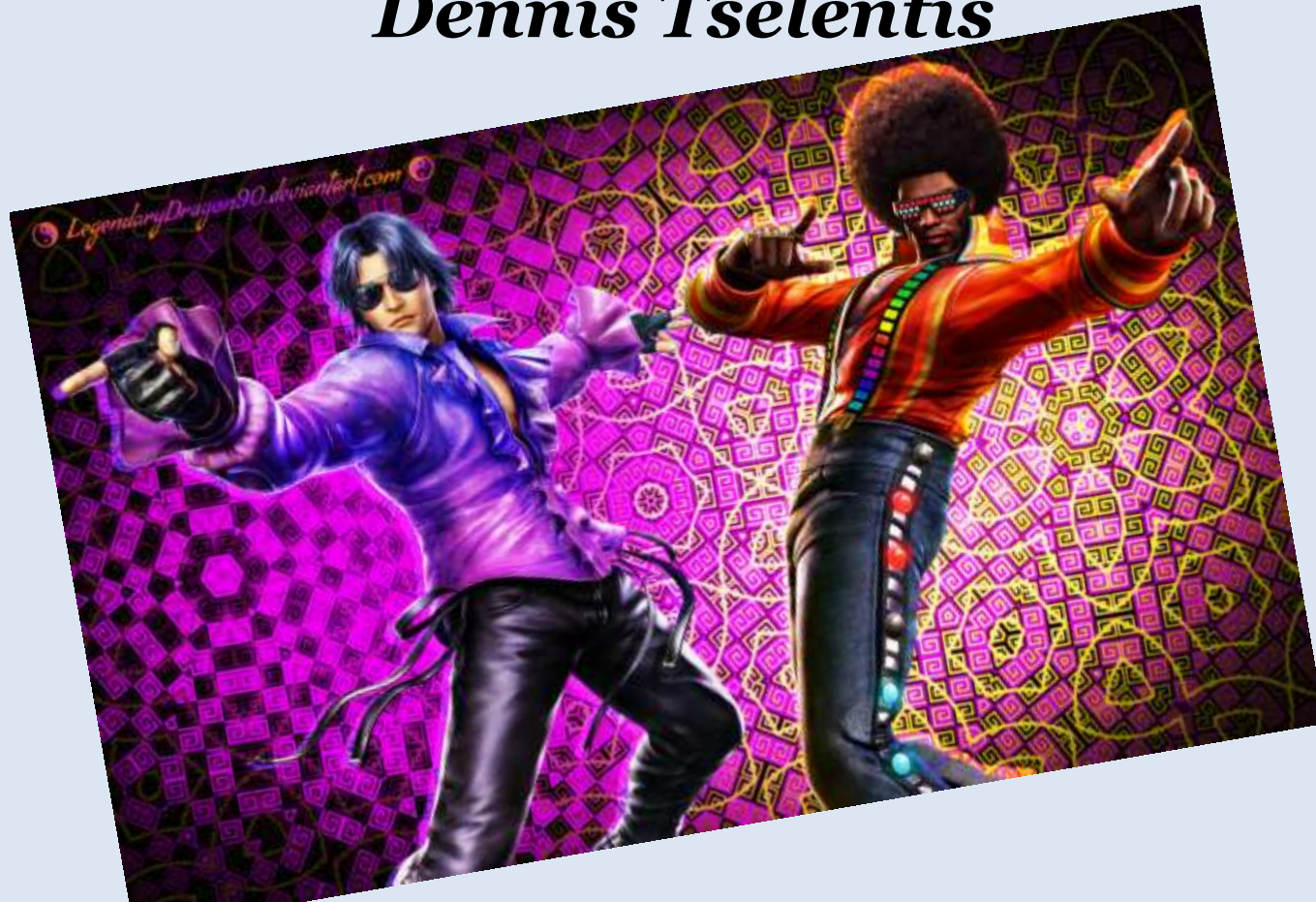

Disco pop style and music instruments

Disco is a [genre](#) of [dance music](#) and a [subculture](#) that emerged in the [1970s](#) from the [United States](#) urban [nightlife](#) scene. Its sound is typified by [four-on-the-floor](#) beats, [syncopated](#) basslines, [string sections](#), horns, [electric piano](#), [synthesizers](#), and electric [rhythm guitars](#).

Disco etymology

The term "disco" is shorthand for the word *discothèque*, a French word for "library of phonograph records" derived from "bibliothèque". The word "discothèque" had the same meaning in English in the 1950s.

"Discothèque" became used in French for a type of nightclub in Paris, France, after these had resorted to playing records during the Nazi occupation in the early 1940s. Some clubs used it as their proper name. In 1960, it was also used to describe a Parisian nightclub in an English magazine.
